Subject: Proposed New Drinking Water Conservation Plan Bylaw

Purpose

To introduce a new Drinking Water Conservation Plan Bylaw to ensure compliance with Metro Vancouver's Drinking Water Conservation Plan (DWCP).

Recommended Resolution(s)

THAT the following bylaws be read a first, second, and third time as recommended in the report dated March 23, 2022 from the Engineering and Operations Department – Infrastructure Engineering Services Division regarding the Proposed New Drinking Water Conservation Plan Bylaw:

- **City of Port Moody Drinking Water Conservation Plan Bylaw, 2022, No. 3346;**
 - **City of Port Moody Municipal Ticket Information Authorization Bylaw, 2020, No. 3218, Amendment Bylaw No. 8, 2022, No. 3349; and**
 - **City of Port Moody Fees Bylaw, 2021, No. 3327, Amendment Bylaw No. 3, 2022, No. 3348**
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Background

After consulting with various stakeholders over the past year, the Greater Vancouver Water District (GVWD) made significant updates to the Metro Vancouver Drinking Water Conservation Plan which were approved by the GVWD Board on October 29, 2021 (**Attachment 1**). The City of Port Moody, as a member of the Water District, is bound to adhere to this conservation plan. The proposed new Water Conservation Plan Bylaw, 2022, No. 3346 (**Attachment 2**) addresses these changes and brings the City's Bylaw into compliance with the Metro Vancouver DWCP.

Discussion

The most significant change to the Metro Vancouver DWCP is the reduction of lawn watering to one day a week during Stage 1 restrictions, with a complete ban on lawn watering in Stage 2.

Stage 1 watering restrictions come into effect annually on May 1 automatically and remain in effect until October 15 unless extended by announcement of the GVWD Commissioner. Subsequent restriction Stages may be activated and deactivated by announcement of the GVWD Commissioner as needed to maximize conservation.

Long-range climate projections show that our region can expect longer summer dry spells and decreased winter snowpack, limiting summer water availability. Reduced lawn watering has been the most effective way to reduce seasonal demand for water and save drinking water for essential uses. With healthy lawns requiring only 1 hour of watering or rain per week, Metro Vancouver decided to update the DWCP to reduce lawn watering to reduce the seasonal demand for water.

Combined with existing education and enforcement programs, this change will help to reduce seasonal water demand and offer benefits across the region including potential deferral of major regional infrastructure projects, greenhouse gas reductions and operational flexibility for environmental flows.

The proposed new Bylaw updates the definitions, restrictions, schedules and prohibitions from the previous Water Shortage Response Plan Bylaw, 2005, No. 2657 in line with the DWCP, and mirrors the regulations contained within the DWCP report published in 2017 by the Greater Vancouver Water District Commissioner and including the changes approved in October 2021.

The new Bylaw encompasses:

- New definitions per Metro Vancouver's DWCP which are relied upon at various stages of water use restrictions
- Updates to existing definitions to add clarity, ease enforcement and provide greater consistency with Metro Vancouver as applicable.
- Updates to water use restrictions in Stage 1 and Stage 2.

City of Port Moody Municipal Ticket Information Authorization Bylaw, 2020, No. 3218, Amendment Bylaw No. 8, 2022, No. 3349 (**Attachment 3**) and City of Port Moody Fees Bylaw, 2020, No. 3327, Amendment Bylaw No. 3, 2022, No. 3348 (**Attachment 4**) are also proposed to allow for enforcement and permitting under the updated DWCP bylaw. Existing fines and fees set out in the previous Water Shortage Response Plan Bylaw, 2005, No. 2657 are not being modified.

Other Option(s)

As the City of Port Moody is a member of the GVWD and is required to adopt the regulations in the Water Conservation Plan Bylaw, no other options are being presented.

Financial Implications

There are no financial implications associated with the proposed Bylaw amendment.

Communications and Civic Engagement Initiatives

The City of Port Moody amplifies Metro Vancouver's annual water restriction communication campaign in the following ways:

- Website – direct link to Metro Vancouver information
- Annual calendar – watering restriction dates (May to October) are included in the City's annual print calendar
- Social media – Metro Vancouver posts are shared via City social media channels

- Focus newsletter – watering restrictions dates and messaging are included in the Focus newsletter
- Digital Billboards – water restriction dates and “We Love Water” campaign messaging is posted on the City’s digital billboards
- Print materials – Metro Vancouver campaign print materials are typically distributed at events and City facilities

Council Strategic Plan Objectives

This proposed new Bylaw is consistent with the Council’s objective of maintaining a sustainable and environmentally responsible community.

Subject: Metro Vancouver: Drinking Water Conservation Plan (DWCP) revisions

Dear RAAC members,

I am emailing you today to share with you news that the GVWD Board, at its meeting on October 29, 2021, approved revisions to the Drinking Water Conservation Plan (DWCP). The revisions include reducing lawn watering to one day per week during Stage 1, with a complete ban on lawn watering in Stage 2.

To ensure a successful roll-out of the new changes we would appreciate our GVWD members make the appropriate amendments to your respective bylaws in advance of May 1, 2022.

Purpose of the DWCP

The DWCP is a regional plan that promotes water conservation and manages how residents, businesses, and member jurisdictions use drinking water during periods of high demand — mostly during late spring to early fall — as well as during water shortages and emergencies. It is implemented through member jurisdictions' bylaws and each member is responsible for monitoring and enforcing the restrictions in their communities.

Purpose of Updating the DWCP

As you know this past summer our region experienced a record-breaking heatwave that resulted in unprecedented sustained high water use. Our daily water consumption hit 1.79 billion litres on June 27, just shy of the 2 billion litre all-time high set in 2009. The region also experienced sustained high water use above 1.5 billion litres per day, for 40 days, compared to the average of only 15 days during a typical summer. This summer we were fortunate that we could meet these high water demands due to the high snow pack, which we can't rely on every year.

The heatwave highlighted the reality of the climate emergency and changing weather conditions, and the need for more proactive measures to secure the water supply. The long-range climate projections show that our region can expect longer summer dry spells and decreased winter snowpack, limiting summer water availability. Reduced lawn watering has been the most effective way to reduce seasonal demand for water and save treated drinking water for where it is needed most: for cooking, cleaning, and drinking during the dry summer months. With healthy lawns requiring only 1 hour of watering or rain per week, Metro Vancouver decided to update the DWCP to reduce lawn watering from two days to one day per week to reduce overall and seasonal demand for water.

DWCP Changes

New Stage 1 lawn watering periods:

- **Residential:**

Even-numbered addresses on Saturdays and odd-numbered addresses on Sundays:

- Automatic watering – from 5 am to 7 am
- Manual watering – from 6 am to 9 am

- **Non-residential:**

Even-numbered addresses on Mondays and odd-numbered addresses on Tuesdays:

- Automatic watering – from 4 am to 6 am
- Manual watering – from 6 am to 9 am

The proposed changes, combined with a strong education and enforcement program, will help reduce seasonal water demand and offer a number of regional benefits, including financial savings, potential deferral of major infrastructure projects, greenhouse gas reductions and operational flexibility for environmental flows.

Metro Vancouver Next Steps and Support to Member Jurisdictions

Metro Vancouver will be promoting this change with a robust communication plan to ensure widespread public notification of the changes to be implemented as of May 1, 2022. As a first step, we have updated our [DWCP webpage](#) and communication materials (e.g. [DWCP summary document](#)) on the Metro Vancouver's website on November 1, which is the date the plan became effective.

We will deliver education and communication campaigns for the region through various avenues including:

- Promote changes through a digital campaign running in November 2021 to encourage good water habits. The campaign will focus on changes to lawn watering regulations, including steps residents can take in the fall and winter to prepare their lawns for spring
- Email landscape, irrigation, and turf farm industry groups to notify them of the changes and offer to meet to answer any questions
- Update education/enforcement communication materials to share with your staff to ensure consistent messaging
- Promote DWCP updates through a campaign in March and April 2022 leading up to the May 1 start date
- Investigate potential summer student/co-op program for door knocking campaigns

We will provide your staff, through their respective committees, regular updates in the coming months on our progress as we roll out our regional communication plan in support of your jurisdiction-focused communication and education programming.

City of Port Moody

Bylaw No. 3346

A Bylaw to regulate the sustainable use of drinking water resources in accordance with the Metro Vancouver Drinking Water Conservation Plan.

WHEREAS pursuant to section 8 of the *Community Charter*, SBC 2003, c 26, as amended, the Council for the City of Port Moody may, by bylaw, provide any service that Council considers necessary or desirable, either directly or through another public authority or another person or organization, and may regulate, prohibit, or impose requirements in relation to such services;

AND WHEREAS there is a desire to provide an effective method of water conservation within the City and to cooperate with the Greater Vancouver Water District to regulate the use of water supplied by the water distribution system for outdoor uses, including landscape irrigation;

NOW THEREFORE, the Council of the City of Port Moody enacts as follows:

1. Citation

- 1.1 This Bylaw may be cited as “City of Port Moody Drinking Water Conservation Plan Bylaw, 2022, No. 3346”.

2. Repeal

- 2.1 City of Port Moody Water Shortage Response Plan Bylaw, No. 2657 and all amendments thereto are hereby repealed.

3. Definitions

- 3.1 In this Bylaw:

“Aesthetic Cleaning” means the use of water for cleaning when it is not for a health or safety reason.

“Aesthetic Water Feature” means a fountain, pond, or other water feature that primarily serves an aesthetic purpose but does not include ponds that contain fish.

“Automatic Shut-off Device” means a device attached to a water hose that shuts off the supply of water automatically unless hand pressure is applied to operate the device.

“Automatic Vehicle Wash System” includes:

- (i) “Conveyor Vehicle Wash” means a commercial vehicle washing facility where the customer’s vehicle moves through an enclosed conveyance mechanism during the wash.
- (ii) “In-bay Vehicle Wash” means a commercial vehicle washing facility where the customer parks the vehicle inside a bay, and the vehicle remains stationary while a spray mechanism moves over the vehicle to clean it.
- (iii) “Basic Wash and Rinse Cycle” means a process sequence in an Automatic Vehicle Wash System that consists of a single wash stage followed by a single rinse stage and no additional processes or optional stages; typically, this is the minimum level of service that a customer can select, where total water usage is less than 200 litres per vehicle.

“Automatic Watering” means applying water using an automated water delivery system that requires only minimal human intervention or supervision and typically employs mechanical, electronic, or other components and devices, including but not limited to timers, sensors, computers, or mechanical appliances.

“City” means the City of Port Moody.

“City Engineer” means the General Manager of Engineering and Operations and their designate(s).

“Commercial Cleaning Operation” means a company, partnership, or person that offers commercial cleaning services, including pressure washing, window cleaning, and other similar building cleaning services, to the public for a fee.

“Commercial Vehicle Washing” means commercial vehicle washing services offered to the public for a fee, but excludes car dealerships, fleet vehicle washing facilities, and charity car washes.

“Commissioner” means the Commissioner of the Greater Vancouver Water District (GVWD), the person that the Administration Board of the GVWD appoints as its Commissioner.

“Drip Irrigation” means an irrigation system that delivers water directly to the root zone of the plant at a low flow rate through individual emission points (emitters) using droplets of water and excludes sprinkler irrigation systems, micro-spray systems, misting systems, and Soaker Hoses.

“Edible Plant” means a plant grown for the purpose of human consumption.

“European Chafer Beetle” means an invasive insect pest whose larvae feed on the roots of grasses, causing serious damage to Lawns. The Chafer Beetle larvae can be treated naturally using nematodes, which typically requires a moist Lawn for a period of two to three weeks from the day of application.

“Flushing Water Main” means discharging water from a water main for routine maintenance, such as water quality management and measurement of firefighting flow capacity.

“Golf Course” means the greens, tee areas, and fairways that are designed and maintained as playing surfaces for golf but does not include rough areas or Lawns that are not maintained as playing surfaces.

“Governments/Schools/Parks” includes property zoned for City, provincial, or federal uses, including road rights-of-way, and school, college, and university uses.

“GVWD” means the Greater Vancouver Water District.

“Hand Wash and Self-service Facility” means a commercial vehicle washing facility where the facility’s staff wash the customer’s vehicle, or the customer washes their own vehicle with spray wands and brushes.

“Health and Safety Reason” means a precaution necessary to protect health and safety, including the removal of contaminants, bodily fluids, and slip and fall hazards, controlling pests, and suppressing and controlling dust.

“Impermeable Surface” means a material added to the surface of the ground or the exterior of a building or structure that is impermeable to water, including but not limited to glass, wood, concrete, asphalt, paving stones, and other similar materials.

“Lawn” means a cultivated area surrounding or adjacent to a building that is covered by grass, turf, or a ground cover plant such as clover, including areas such as boulevards, parks, school yards, and cemeteries, but excluding Golf Courses, Soil-Based Playing Fields, and Sand-Based Playing Fields.

“Manual Watering” means applying water using a device or tool that is manually held or operated by a human being, without Automatic Watering.

“New Lawn” means a Lawn that is newly established either by seeding or the laying of new sod or turf.

“Non-Residential” means those properties zoned for a permitted use other than a Residential use, including commercial, industrial, and institutional uses, and including property zoned for mixed Residential and Non-Residential uses, but excluding Governments/Schools/Parks.

“Non-Residential Pool and Hot Tub” means a pool or hot tub permitted to be operated in accordance with health authorities having jurisdiction over pool and hot tub regulation, including pools and hot tubs operated by government agencies, hotels, multi-family strata corporations, and private clubs.

“Odd-Numbered Civic Address or Even-Numbered Civic Address” means the numerical portion of the street address of a property, and in the case of multi-unit commercial or Residential complex such as townhouses, condominiums, or other strata-titled properties, means the numerical portion of the street address that is assigned to the entire complex, and not the individual unit number.

“Over-Seeded” means the application of grass seed on existing turf, typically in early fall or spring and may also include associated processes such as aeration, weeding, dethatching, and fertilization, for the purpose of mitigating against grass thinning.

“Permit” means a permit issued pursuant to section 5.

“Person” does not include a municipality, a regional district, the provincial government, or any body appointed or created under an enactment of Canada or British Columbia.

“Public Announcement” means one or more advertisements or public service announcements in any one of:

- (i) a television or radio broadcast from a station that broadcasts to the City of Port Moody; or
- (ii) a newspaper or other publication intended for general circulation, including one that is distributed without charge to the reader, that contains news and advertising, and is distributed within the City of Port Moody at least once per week.

“Residential” means a property zoned for single-family or multi-family Residential use.

“Residential Pool and Hot Tub” means a Residential pool or hot tub installed for the use of the occupants and guests of one single-family dwelling or duplex and does not require a permit in accordance with health authorities having jurisdiction over pool and hot tub regulation.

“Restriction Stage” means Stage 1 Restrictions, Stage 2 Restrictions, Stage 3 Restrictions, or Stage 4 Restrictions.

“Sand-Based Playing Field” means a playing field that is constructed with a highly permeable sand-based root zone typically 30cm to 40cm deep over a drainage system with drainpipes bedded in gravel and is designed and maintained to be playable year-round.

“Soaker Hose” means a garden hose or pipe with small holes that allows water to seep into the ground, to the roots of plants, discharging water through the entire length of its porous surface.

“Soil-Based Playing Field” means a playing field that is covered with grass, sod, or turf that is designed and maintained to be played upon, or that is used for sporting or other community events and activities, but does not include Lawns, Golf Courses, or Sand-Based Playing Fields.

“Stage 1 Restrictions” means the restrictions on Water use described in Part 1 of Schedule 1.

“Stage 2 Restrictions” means the restrictions on Water use described in Part 2 of Schedule 1.

“Stage 3 Restrictions” means the restrictions on Water use described in Part 3 of Schedule 1.

“Stage 4 Restrictions” means the restrictions on Water use described in Part 4 of Schedule 1.

“Vehicle” is a device in, on, or by which a person or item is or may be transported or drawn on a highway or other roadway.

“Water” used as a noun means water supplied directly or indirectly by Greater Vancouver Water District or the City of Port Moody, whether or not mixed with rainwater, gray water, or recycled water.

“Water” and “Watering” used as a verb mean the application or distribution of Water (used as a noun) to lands or plants but does not include the method known as Drip Irrigation.

“Watering Lawn” means applying Water to a Lawn with any device or tool including but not limited to a sprinkler, hose, mister, or Drip Irrigation.

“Water Management Plan” means a plan proposed by the owner or operator of a Golf Course, Soil-Based Playing Field, or Sand-Based Playing Field and approved by the City Engineer pursuant to section 5. The Plan sets out terms such as water use targets during the different stages of the Drinking Water Conservation Plan (DWCP), restriction to reduce water use, and reporting requirements for the owner or operator.

“Water Play Park” means a recreational facility that is primarily outdoors, including spray pools and wading pools, spray parks, splash pads, and water slides.

“Water Restriction Announcement” means a Stage 1 Announcement, a Stage 2 Announcement, a Stage 3 Announcement, or a Stage 4 Announcement.

4. Declaration and Announcement of Restriction Stages

4.1 The Commissioner may, by letter to the City, declare that the Greater Vancouver Water District has activated a Restriction Stage.

a) If the Commissioner makes a declaration pursuant to section 4.1, the Restriction Stage described in the declaration comes into force in the City 72 hours after the Commissioner or the City makes a Public Announcement of the declaration.

b) When a Restriction Stage comes into force under this section, a Restriction Stage that had been in force, if any, ceases to be in force.

4.2 If no Restriction Stage is in force on May 1st of any year, Stage 1 Restrictions come into force on that date without prior declaration of the Commissioner or announcement pursuant to section 4.3.

- 4.3 If the Commissioner declares that the Greater Vancouver Water District has activated:
- a) Stage 1 Restrictions, a Public Announcement by the City or the Commissioner is sufficient for the purposes of section 4.1 a) if it contains substantially the information set out in Schedule “2”.
 - b) Stage 2 Restrictions, a Public Announcement by the City or the Commissioner is sufficient for the purposes of section 4.1 a) if it contains substantially the information set out in Schedule “3”.
 - c) Stage 3 Restrictions, a Public Announcement the City or the Commissioner is sufficient for the purposes of section 4.1 a) if it contains substantially the information set out in Schedule “4”.
 - d) Stage 4 Restrictions, a Public Announcement by the City or the Commissioner is sufficient for the purposes of section 4.1 a) if it contains substantially the information set out in Schedule “5”.
- 4.4 No Restriction Stage remains in force after October 15th of any year unless the Commissioner makes a declaration under this section.
- a) At any time before or after October 15th of any year, the Commissioner may, by letter to the City, declare that, notwithstanding section 4.4, a Restriction Stage will remain in force or come into force after October 15th.
 - b) Subsections 4.1 a) and 4.1 b), and section 4.3 apply to a declaration made under this section, with such changes as are necessary, except that a Public Announcement of a declaration under this section shall state that the Restriction Stage that is continued in force or that comes into force after October 15th will remain in force until further declaration of the Commissioner.
 - c) The Commissioner may make one or more declarations under this section.

5. Permits

- 5.1 A Person who has installed a new Lawn, either by placing sod or turf or by seeding, or who has installed new landscaping on a substantial part of the outdoor portion of a premises may apply to the City Engineer for a Permit authorizing the Person to Water the new Lawn and new landscaping when Stage 1 Restrictions are in force, at times specified in the Permit, at the premises described in the Permit, during the currency of the Permit. A Permit does not exempt the holder from Stage 3 Restrictions or Stage 4 Restrictions.
- 5.2 The City Engineer, upon being satisfied that an applicant qualifies under section 5.1, shall issue a Permit to the applicant in the form set out in Schedule “6” upon payment of a fee prescribed in the City of Port Moody Fees Bylaw.

- 5.3 A Permit issued pursuant to section 5.2 shall be affixed to a post facing the street serving the premises, beside the principal driveway from the street to the premises.
- 5.4 A Permit issued pursuant to section 5.2 shall expire and be of no force or effect 21 days after the date of its issue unless the Person has been issued an extension pursuant to section 5.5.
- 5.5 Before or after the expiration of a Permit issued pursuant to section 5.2, a Person may apply for one extension of the Permit on the same terms and conditions as may be imposed pursuant to section 5.2. Such an extension shall end on or before 42 days from the date of the issue of the Permit pursuant section 5.2.
- 5.6 A person who has treated a Lawn by applying nematodes that require additional watering outside of the allowable sprinkling restrictions may apply to the City Engineer for a Permit authorizing the Person to Water the affected area when Stage 1 Restrictions are in force, at times specified in the Permit, at the premises described in the Permit, during the currency of the Permit. A Permit does not exempt the holder from Stage 3 Restrictions or Stage 4 Restrictions.
- 5.7 The City Engineer, upon being satisfied that an applicant qualifies pursuant to section 5.6, shall issue a Permit to the applicant in the form set out in Schedule "7".
- 5.8 A Permit issued pursuant to section 5.6 shall be affixed to a post facing the street serving the premises, beside the principal driveway from the street to the premises.
- 5.9 A Permit issued pursuant to section 5.6 shall expire and be of no force or effect 14 days after the date of its issue.
- 5.10 Previously issued Lawn sprinkling exemption Permits will remain valid during Stage 3.

6. Offence and Penalty

- 6.1 A Person who violates or contravenes any of the provisions of this Bylaw or suffers or allows to be done any act or thing that violates or contravenes this Bylaw, commits an offence under this Bylaw punishable on summary conviction and is liable to the fines set out in sections 6.2 and 6.3.
- 6.2 Subject to section 6.3, if a prosecution is commenced pursuant to section 6.2 b), upon conviction the offender shall be liable to pay a fine:
 - a) for a first conviction for an offence, of not more than \$10,000 and not less than \$3,000;
 - b) for a second or subsequent conviction for an offence, of not more than \$10,000 and not less than \$5,000 for each offence.

- 6.3 Where a prosecution is commenced against a commercial entity pursuant to section 6.2 b) for an offence committed while Stage 4 restrictions are in effect, whether or not a Water Use Plan is in effect for the offender, upon conviction that Person shall be liable to pay a fine of not less than \$5,000.
- 6.4 Section 6.2 b) applies whether or not a second or subsequent conviction is for conduct that preceded the conduct that is the subject matter of the prosecution then before the court.
- 6.5 If an offence under this Bylaw continues for more than one day, separate fines each not exceeding the maximum fine for that offence may be imposed for each day or part thereof in respect of which the offence occurs or continues.
- 6.6 In a prosecution under this Bylaw, the onus of establishing an exemption under Part 1, Part 2, or Part 3 of Schedule "1" lies on the Person claiming the exemption.
