Trail Network Plan	6.1	Presentation: Project Manager
		Staff gave a presentation entitled "Trail Network Plan" and referred to slides contained within the on-table package.
		The Committee discussed the Trail Network Plan, noting that:
		 trails could benefit from more wayfinding and signage, including information about accessibility, difficulty level, access and exit points, and benches and rest stops; there is untapped potential for recreational trails on Heritage Mountain; more accessibility considerations could be incorporated into trails, including smooth access pathways to benches, and minimizing transition gaps such as between bridges and trails;
		 safety measures should be in place to ensure the safe interaction between e-scooters, e-bikes and pedestrians, such as speed limitations, rumble strips, or designated lanes for e-bikes and pedestrians;
		 establishing designated lanes for speed ranges could be beneficial;
		 parents with strollers and wagons should be considered when formulating trail plans; it would be beneficial to widen the path between Shoreline Trail and Rocky Point Pier;
		 the removal of accessible parking at accessible trail heads is concerning; and a designated drop-off zone for Coquitlam e-scooters at Falcon Drive could be explored.
		Staff answered questions regarding the following topics:
		 if the Shoreline Trail will be more accessible once upgrades are complete; and the rationale behind the design of the bike path along Murray Street.

Tri-Cities Climate Mobility Strategy Phase 1	6.2	Verbal Report: Engineering and Operations Department Staff provided an overview of the Tri-Cities Climate Mobility Strategy Phase 1, noting that:
		 the Strategy is still underway and is in a preliminary phase; a roadmap to achieve zero emissions is being created; e-micro mobility and electric vehicles are a focus; recommendations on EV charging facilities, corporate fleet transitions and e-micro mobility will likely be included; and the Strategy is scheduled to be presented to Council and the Committee in the Fall.
	7.	Information
Staff Updates	7.1	 Staff provided the following updates: several Metro Vancouver cities have conducted a provincially permitted pilot project regarding e-scooters; Coquitlam has reported roughly 600 rides per day; once the pilot ends in April 2024, the Province will review the results and may amend the <i>Motor Vehicle Act</i>; and
		 the City recommends reviewing the results from other

the City recommends reviewing the results from other • municipalities before introducing e-scooters in bike lanes.
